

Dear St Thomas Aquinas Families,

In March 2013 Jorge Mario Bergoglio, Archbishop of Buenos Aires was elected as the 266th Pope of the Catholic Church. He chose the name Francis after St Francis of Assisi.

From the moment Pope Francis appeared on the balcony of St Peter's Basilica, he has won the respect and admiration of people the world over. His humility, joyfulness and simplicity reveal a leader who is deeply interested in real people for their goodness, kindness and humanity. He has demonstrated himself as a man comfortable with having real conversations with people and seeking to be in in direct contact with them. To illustrate this recently he announced he will no longer use the bulletproof Popemobile as the glass 'sardine can' keeps him away from people. In a typically self-effacing way Pope Francis recently commented, 'It is true that anything could happen, but let's face it, at my age I don't have much to lose.'



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In his short time as Pope, Francis has also spoken extensively about education. His writings and discourse in this area centre on his passionate belief that at the heart of Catholic education there needs to always be a daily personal encounter with Jesus Christ.

School can and should function as a catalyst, being a place of encounter and convergence of the entire educational community with a single objective of shaping and helping young people to grow as mature, simple, honest, and competent persons who know how to love faithfully, who know how to live their lives as a response to God's call and their future professions as a service to society.

At the personal level and in practical terms Pope Francis points to 3 key languages of learning that a mature person needs to know to be fully human:

- the language of the mind
- the language of the heart
- the language of the hands

He makes the further point that true learning occurs when these 3 languages are working together in harmony.

- Think about what you say and do
- Listen to what you think and what you do
- And do well what you think and do

usually takes time to happen. It is important for us not to lose sight of one of education's fundamental aspects, which is respecting each child's readiness to learn and the awareness that real learning usually takes time to happen.

It is also about remaining mindful that not all expected results can be seen or ascertained right now. Like the parable of the sower who is busy sowing without always seeing the fruits of his work - educating both at home and at school requires working with hope and confidence believing that, in time, our work will also bear fruit.

Thank you to everyone for your commitment and work this term. Wishing all a safe term break.

#### St Vincent de Paul Society 'Buddies Day Program' – Tuesday 8 July (School Holidays)

We have a large supervision ratio, with every two children having at least one leader to guide them. The next statements will be sent out Tuesday 22 July and the final instalment of fees are due by 19 August. It is therefore important to ensure the second term fee instalment has been paid. Please be aware that part payment of fees without a formal arrangement in place will not stop any further correspondence.

#### School Reports – Semester 1

Later this week your child's Semester One Report will be sent home. The Semester Reports are based on student achievement for their grade level and for that particular Semester. The Student Report is one of the modes of providing feed-back about your child's learning progress. Each child is unique and on their own learning journey and it is important for parents to view their child's learning as individual. Teachers use a variety of strategies and assessment modes to continually monitor and report on student progress over the course of each semester.

#### **Achievement Scale**

The format of the Grade 1-6 reports use an E to A standards scale to report achievement and has two important components. These can be thought of in terms of **what is learnt** and **how well it is learnt and applied**. Another way to think of this scale is in following way: **E – Awakening, D-Applying, C- Accelerating, B- Advanced, A- Adept** 

#### Effort, Personal-Social Development & Behaviour

The other important scales on the Report relates to student effort, personal-social development and behaviour. The interpersonal and intrapersonal attributes of determination, perseverance, resilience, self-control and collaboration are important to successful learning. It is therefore important that the achievement and effort descriptors are read together as they both work together in describing how students are progressing. Jackeroo Ranch Horse Riding Camps: Located at Bingletree Station in the beautiful Turon Valley (in the Bathurst area) Jackeroo Ranch (established 50 years) is running their popular winter horse riding camps. 1<sup>st</sup> Week: Saturday 28 June – Saturday 5 July; 2<sup>nd</sup> Week: Saturday 5 July – Sunday 13 July. Shorter stays are possible if camps are not fully booked. These camps are for 'horse mad' children aged 6 to 16 years. Five to six hours per day are devoted to horse activities including a one hour lesson and three hours trail riding – with tuition still being given.
