Dear St Thomas Aquinas Families,

I recall reading that it took the American songwriter Paul Simon six months to complete the lyrics to one of his best-known compositions, The Sounds of Silence. In writing the song he averaged one line per week. Between the writing of each lyrical line there were days when literally no words came – just silence. It made me think about the times in our lives when words just do not cut it and when our silence speaks more appropriately than verbal language.

As a young boy my father would often advise me, "Se non hai nientedi bene da dire, non dire niente". Translated into English it means, "If you have nothing nice to say, say nothing at all". This mantra has served me well as a timely reminder that sometimes words offered can get in the way.

Recently I have further reflected on my father's advice when thinking about the place of silence in my own life. It is a reality in our modern world that silence can be a rare commodity and in many respects hard for many of us to deal with at all. We are conditioned to fill any pauses and silences with words and sounds. We don't need to be silent all the time. However, it is in the silences and the pauses between our words that God exists and in turn, the Spirit does its work.

Mother Teresa explains this better:

In the silence of the heart God speaks. If you face God in prayer and silence, God will speak to you. Then you will know that you are nothing. It is only when you realize your nothingness, your emptiness that God can fill you with Himself.

Silence and reflection are integral parts of the learning cycle. They help students to make connections, to think, to ponder, to wait, to consider possibilities and to dream. There are times in

the school day when students are guided to be silent as a way of focussing their attention on what they have learnt, of allowing for exploration and assimilation of ideas and therefore, as a way of personalising their learning.

STAFF DEVELOPMENT DAY – MONDAY 8 APRIL, 2019



To mark the beginning of this special time of refection and renewal our school joined together with many families for a beautiful liturgy to mark the beginning of the season of Lent. During the liturgy all in attendance received the mark of ashes on their foreheads. The ashes burnt from last year's Palm Sunday palms symbolise our beginning and our ending and challenge us anew to act with compassion, generosity and humility during this 40-day season.

The beginning of Lent also focuses our attention on how we can provide practical support to those who are not as well off as ourselves. Each class received a Project Compassion box dedicated to raising funds to assist communities both here and overseas to help themselves. 

School Music Lessons and Choirs

The school is proud to offer Music lessons to all students K-6 through a specialist Music teacher, Leigha Wills. Furthermore, students have the opportunity to be involved in choral singing either through the Junior Choir (Grades 2 & 3) or Senior Choir (Grades 4-6). Captivate School Band Program

Currently we have over 100 students involved in learning a musical instrument through small group weekly tuition provided by CEDPs Captivate program. The school currently has five Band Tutors who teach at the school each week. Students in the Band program also experience being part of a band ensemble as they become more proficient with their chosen instrument. The school has recently purchased a number of new instruments that will become part of our school's ongoing permanent instrument collection.

Italian – Languages Other Than English

For more than a decade our school has been able to offer Italian as an additional language taught by Mrs Jenni Wurf. Mrs Wurf is a tertiary qualified LOTE teacher with a great passion for all aspects of Italian language and culture. In the early years (K-2)

weekly lessons emphasise the development of listening and speaking skills through vocabulary, stories, songs, rhymes and games. In this way the students begin to gain a sense of the sound and rhythm of the language. From middle primary school students begin to develop skills in reading and writing through a range of developmental activities. As well as a focus on language, a number of cultural experiences are included highlighting food, art, architecture and customs.

Physical Education

Another area of learning that is taught by a specialist teacher, Ann Gippel, is Physical Education. Each class has one timetabled lesson each week taught by the specialist teacher; the regular class teacher supplements this lesson on another day. As well as

weekly lessons in Physical Education all students participate in regular Personal Development and Health lessons that are also part of this Key Learning Area. Students also have the opportunity to participate in a vast number of local and regional sporting events.

Library

This is a focal point of the school coordinated by our Teacher/Librarian, Karen Bousfield. The Library is centrally situated in our school and supports student learning through the promotion of quality children's literature. The Library provides opportunities for students to borrow on a weekly basis, take part in book fairs and The NSW Premier's Reading Challenge. The Library is open for students during a number of lunch times per week. It provides a wonderful space to read, play chess, and talk about books and share stories.

STACC'S ON! (ST THOMAS AQUINAS CODING CLUB IS ON!)



In Week 6 we launched the St Thomas Aquinas Coding Club (STACC) with an amazing turn out and great enthusiasm from over 200 students. The club will run during lunch time on different days for different grades. This week the students who wish to participate will bring home a permission note to be signed and returned to school. The club is open to anyone. If your son or daughter did not go to the launch, they can still join throughout the year by turning up to the club when it is announced at lunch time. The students will be working with Spheros, Ozobots, Scratch and other coding Apps.





Early Years Assessment (EYA) - Kindergarten, Year 1 and Year 2

During Weeks 6 and 7 all students in Kindergarten, Year 1 and Year 2 underwent mandatory EYA testing. This important part of school life provides vital information about your child's learning and enables teachers to tailor their teaching program to individual student needs and abilities.

The testing is done on an individual basis and can take up to 1 hour per student depending on the age and abilities of the child. The testing needs to be done by the class teacher. EYA provides the teacher with invaluable information.

Although we have an amazing bank of casual teachers at STA that follow the teacher's written program, we understand the impact this can have on the continuity of teaching staff for the class. We thank you for your patience and support during this time and now that the testing period is over, it is back to business as usual!

NAPLAN 2019 - Year 3 & 5


This year's NAPLAN will be completed online for all students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. The only component of NAPLAN that will not be completed online is the **Year 3 Writing Task**, which will remain as a pencil and paper test for this year only. The Catholic Education Office - Parramatta (CEDP) and all teachers at St Thomas Aquinas have been working to ensure a smooth transition to this method of testing and CEDP has provided a comprehensive guide for parents. The following link to this site has invaluable information for all parents and carers when it comes this year's NAPLAN. Please take the time to go through it and contact us if you have any questions. A letter will be going home this week that outlines the process and requirements for NAPLAN this year. In the week starting 25 March, all students in Years 3 and 5 will sit a "Practice Test" that will ensure that they understand how to log-in, use the different tools and answer the different types of questions. You can help by encouraging your children to access the "Public Demonstration Site" (https://www.nap.edu.au/online-assessment/public-demonstration-site) and practice a test for their grade. The practice test that will be completed on 25 March is different to the tests on the Public Demonstration Site. We also ask that all students have **their own pair of earbuds/headphones** for both the practice test on 25 March and the actual test in May.



Student's Personal Technology at STA

STA is asking that all students please give their personal digital technology devices to their classroom teacher at the beginning of the day. The devices will be returned at home time. This policy is in-line with other primary schools in the Diocese and is in place to ensure that students are not contacting other people in school time (including family members) or accessing inappropriate sites and Apps. It also protects students' expensive belongings against theft.



Items to be handed in include: phones, iPads, computers and smart watches that have cellular capabilities and connect to the WIFI. (This does not include fit bits.) Thank you for supporting us with this important policy.

Communication Between School and Home

Parents and community members play an important role in their child's education. A strong partnership between parents as first educators of their children, and the school enriches the child's learning experience immeasurably. There are a variety of formal and informal opportunities for parents to be informed about their child's progress and to communicate effectively with the school.



Student Learning Reports

All schools in the Catholic Education Diocese of Parramatta (CEDP) provide parents with written reports on their child's learning achievement and effort, twice a year. These Student Reports are issued at the conclusion of Semester 1 (end of Term 2) and the end of Semester 2 (Term 4). The Student Learning Reports are supplemented by meetings (planned and by request) to discuss student learning progress.

Parent-Teacher Meetings

Parent-Teacher meetings are scheduled at the start of each year for the purpose of sharing student learning information. There are also further opportunities to meet, such as Family Learning Conferences at the beginning of Term 3 to discuss student progress and goal set for Semester 2. Parent-Teacher Meetings include:

- Meet-the-Teacher Meeting: Beginning of Term 1
- Family Learning Conferences: Beginning of Term 3
- Parent/Teacher Meetings: Requested by either parents or teachers (throughout the year)
- **Personal Plan Meetings (PP Meetings):** Collaborative meetings between parents, teachers and the Learning Support Team to goal set and map out a personal learning plan for students with specific needs.

Consent Policy for Enrolled Students

If parents/carers wish to change consent for raffle tickets to be sent home or for the use of students' image and/or works, please notify the school in writing or request a new consent form. Change of consent will not be retrospective e.g. already published photos and works <u>published before change of consent</u> will not be taken down/destroyed, although if safety concerns are notified all reasonable efforts will be made to remove any published information.

Book Club (Issue 2) was recently given out to the students and **orders are NOW DUE to be returned or finalised online.** Please check that order forms are filled out correctly including both the child's name and class. <u>Credit</u> card payments must be made online via the Loop.

Attendance and Student Leave

Class Roll Requirements - Record of Attendance

All parents are to ensure their children arrive at school **by 9.05am** each school day. The Class Roll must always be electronically marked accurately to record daily attendances. Teachers are obliged by law to record this information if, when, and the reason a student attends school for only part of a day or if they are absent.

This means that if your child arrives late for school or leaves early, then a record of such must be made. A note for the class teacher is also required. If your child is absent from school for any reason, a note to the class teacher stating the reason for absence and the date/s, must be sent on his/her return. These notes should be received within 7 days or the absence is recorded as unjustified.

Extended Leave of Absence

Notification needs to be given in writing to the Principal for leave of 1-4 days. Leave in excess of 5 school days must be processed and approved by the Catholic Education Diocese of Parramatta (CEDP). Application forms are available at the School Office.

Do you live alone or have responsibility of young dependents, elderly relatives or neighbours?

Research, and our experiences from October 2013, show that many women were home alone or with young children and often didn't know what to do. In some cases found themselves in very dangerous situations.

Have you recently moved to the Mountains?

Since the 2013 Bushfires, a large number of new residents have moved into the area and many are unaware of their bushfire risk and unsure how to act in the event of a bushfire.

What is the aim of a Women Skilled & Ready workshop?

What new skills will I learn if I attend?

St Thomas Aquinas School Sport Selection Guidelines (Revised 2019)

Representing our school provides an opportunity for talented and enthusiastic athletes, who are proficient in the fundamental skills related to their chosen sport, to extend their skills and compete against similarly skilled students from other schools. Representing the school is a privilege and students who represent the school have the responsibility to compete at all times in a manner that demonstrates good sportsmanship and exemplary behaviour.

Selection of School Teams

Students will have the opportunity to trial for relevant school teams. The Team Coach/Manager (and where possible at least one other selector) should select teams. This other selector may be another teacher who is qualified or experienced in that sport.

Trialling of Teams

At least one trial will be conducted before selecting the team, although two trials are preferable if time permits. This will allow all students to be given an equal opportunity to exhibit their ability and natural athleticism before the team is finally selected.


Selection Criteria

The criteria for selection includes:

- Student ability and natural athleticism: Students need to demonstrate an ability or natural athleticism in the sport being trialled.
- Behaviour at school, sport and on other school activities: The behaviour of students at school both in the classroom and on the playground as well as at school activities and excursions will be considered before selecting teams. If the student has regularly displayed inappropriate behaviour they may be excluded from trialling and representing the school at sport. Decisions in such circumstances will be made in consultation with the Principal/Assistant Principal.
- Attitude and sportsmanship: Students need to display a positive attitude and good sportsmanship towards others, they will display inclusivity and be respectful of other team members as well as coaches and referees.
- **Commitment and reliability:** Students need to commit to the team for which they trial. This includes attendance at any scheduled training session and team meetings.
- **Previous playing experience:** Previous playing experience of the student while representing the school will be considered when selecting the teams.
- Extenuating circumstances: If a student is unable to trial for a sport due to illness, injury or school absence it will be at the discretion of the coach and the Principal/Assistant Principal, who will confer and a decision will be made as to whether this student would be eligible to play in the team.

Conflict of Interest

An additional independent selector from the school leadership team will be included in the selection process in the event of a possible or perceived conflict of interest. In such circumstances consultation with the Principal/Assistant Principal will also be necessary prior to final team selection.

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NAPLAN Online – information for parents and carers

Why do students do NAPLAN?

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) assesses literacy and numeracy skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life. Students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 participate in the annual NAPLAN tests in reading, writing, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy.

The assessment provides parents and schools with an understanding of how individual students are performing at the time of the tests. NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process - it does not replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance.

NAPLAN also provides schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are meeting important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

What is assessed?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular school curriculum. All government and non-government education authorities have contributed to the development of NAPLAN materials.

In 2019 most students across Australia will sit NAPLAN online.

Feedback in the first year of NAPLAN Online showed that students engaged well with online assessments. One of the main benefits of NAPLAN Online is tailored (or adaptive) testing, where the test automatically adapts to a student's test performance. The test presents questions of higher or lower complexity, depending on a student's performance.

Tailored (or adaptive) testing is designed to assess a wider range of student abilities and to measure student achievement more precisely. Your child should not be concerned if they find questions more challenging than usual; they may be taking a more complex test pathway. A student's overall NAPLAN score is based on the number and complexity of questions they answer correctly. NAPLAN Online is not a test of keyboard skills. There are variations in how fast and well a student can type – just as there are variations in how fast and well a student can write by hand. Year 3 students will complete the writing test on paper.

How can I help my child prepare?

Help your child prepare by reassuring them that NAPLAN is just one part of their school program, and by reminding them on the day to simply try their best. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions in the tests and will provide appropriate support and guidance. Ensuring students are familiar with using devices, typing on them and navigating through programs are a part of student learning and a requirement of the Australian Curriculum from the first year at school.

ACARA does not recommend excessive preparation for NAPLAN or the use of coaching providers. NAPLAN is about assessing learning progress in literacy and numeracy.

Will my child sit NAPLAN on paper or online?

In 2019, your child will sit the NAPLAN online tests. However, children in some other schools across Australia will sit the NAPLAN paper tests this year. Federal, state and territory education ministers have agreed that all schools will move online by 2020. State and territory education authorities will determine when their schools move online.

As students are assessed on the same literacy and numeracy curriculum content, regardless of whether they complete the test online or on paper, results for both formats can be reported on the same NAPLAN assessment scale. To find out more about NAPLAN Online, visit nap.edu.au





Participation in NAPLAN

All students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 are expected to participate in the annual NAPLAN assessment.

Students with disability may qualify for adjustments that reflect the support normally provided for classroom assessments. You should first discuss the use of any disability adjustments for your child with your child's teacher.

A formal exemption may be granted for a student with disability that severely limits their capacity to participate in the assessment, or for a student who has recently arrived in Australia and has a non-English speaking background.

Your school principal and your local test administration authority can give you more information on NAPLAN Online disability adjustments or the process required to gain a formal exemption.

NAPLAN Online 2019 timetable

The assessment window for NAPLAN Online is extended from three days provided for the paper test to nine days. This is to give schools more flexibility in scheduling and accommodate schools that may have fewer devices. The NAPLAN Online assessment window starts on Tuesday 14 May and finishes on Friday 24 May 2019.

The online tests must be taken in the following order:

What If my child is absent from school on assessment days?

Where possible, schools may arrange for individual students who are absent at the time of testing to complete missed tests at another time during the school's test schedule. Individual students are not permitted to sit NAPLAN online tests after Friday 24 May 2019.

How is my child's performance measured?

Individual student performance is shown on a national achievement scale for each assessment. A result at the national minimum standard indicates that the student has demonstrated the basic literacy and numeracy skills needed to participate fully in that year level.

A NAPLAN individual student report will be issued by your child's school later in the year. If you do not receive a report, you should contact your child's school.

How are NAPLAN results used?

- Students and parents may use individual results to discuss progress with teachers.
- Teachers use results to better identify students who would benefit from greater challenges or extra support.
- Schools use results to identify strengths and areas to improve in teaching programs, and to set goals in literacy and numeracy.
- School systems use results to review programs and support offered to schools.
- The community can see average school NAPLAN results at myschool.edu.au
